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The International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard measures the progress of federal legislative efforts regarding international religious freedom.

INTRODUCTION



Embattled religious minorities and dissenting members of majority religious communities suffer extraordinary pressures — even genocide— as the essential freedom of religion deteriorates worldwide. Defending the fundamental right to conscience is a leading challenge of our time. Our aim at 21Wilberforce is to see religious communities protected, imprisoned leaders released, and harmful policies reformed for freedom of belief for all.

Here in the U.S. that effort begins in partnership with congressional leadership. For decades, U.S. policymakers have sought to promote religious freedom abroad, reflecting support for human rights in U.S. foreign policy. Protection of religious freedom is also affirmed in international law through the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, and other instruments. Congress has been an advocate for international religious freedom issues and has sought to ensure continued support for religious freedom as a focus of U.S. foreign policy, most prominently through passage of the International Religious Freedom Act of 1998 (IRFA) (P.L. 105-292).

IRFA is the foundational legislation for U.S. international religious freedom (IRF) policy. Recognizing religious freedom as a "universal human right," IRFA created various government mechanisms aimed at cementing IRF as a foreign policy priority of the United States. Most significantly, the law

- created an Office on International Religious Freedom within the State Department headed by an Ambassador at Large (AAL) for IRF;
- required that the Secretary of State issue an annual report on the status of religious freedom around the world;
- mandated that the President identify "countries of particular concern" (CPCs) and prescribed punitive actions in response to violations of religious freedom, subject to presidential waiver authority;
- created the independent U.S.
 Commission on International
 Religious Freedom (USCIRF); and
- amended the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) to make inadmissible into the United States foreign government officials who have committed particularly severe religious freedom violations.

Congress has subsequently strengthened IRFA via amendment, notably through the Frank R. Wolf International Religious Freedom Act (Wolf IRFA; P.L. 114-281), which became law in December 2016. The major provisions of the law

- called for the AAL for IRF to have a greater role within interagency policy processes and to report directly to the Secretary of State;
- mandated designation of a "special watch list" of countries with severe violations of religious freedom but that did not meet CPC criteria;
- mandated designation of non-state entities of particular concern (EPCs).

Six years ago 21Wilberforce launched the International Religious Freedom Scorecard to track continuing efforts by Congress to counter affronts to international religious freedom. This biannual Scorecard is nonpartisan. We do not promote specific issues or legislation, nor do we offer opinions about the work that is being done in Congress. In addition to caucus and commission work, the Scorecard tracks how members of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives sponsored, cosponsored, and voted on bills, resolutions, and amendments that support international religious freedom.

21Wilberforce goals for publishing the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard are to:

- Recognize and thank members of Congress who have championed international religious freedom in tangible ways;
- Encourage legislators to take even bolder actions in support of this cause and the restoration of human dignity around the world; and
- Provide citizens with a nonpartisan, concise summary of public actions taken by Congress on issues related to international religious freedom.



OUT OF A COMBINED 91 ITEMS SCORED, TWO WERE VOTED INTO LAW AND BOTH LAWS PASSED UNANIMOUSLY OR WITH AN OVERWHELMING MAJORITY.

S.1838 Hong Kong Human Rights and Democracy Act of 2019

This law directs various departments to assess whether political developments in Hong Kong justify changing Hong Kong's unique treatment under U.S. law.

S.3744 Uyghur Human Rights Policy Act of 2020

This law imposes sanctions on foreign individuals and entities responsible for human rights abuses in China's Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous region and requires various reports on the topic.

- O1 Congress introduced 91 items (37 in the Senate and 54 in the House) relating to freedom of belief, freedom of conscience, or religion during the 116th Congress.
- This activity represents a 21% decrease in the number of items introduced and scored in the 116th Congress versus the 115th Congress.
- As was true with the 115th Congress, overall final scoring for the 116th Congress shows strong bipartisan support for IRF issues, with Democrats and Republicans working together sponsoring, cosponsoring, and voting on IRF legislation in the Senate and the House.
- O4 Thirty-eight percent (38) of all Senators scored "above average."
- 05 Thirty percent (131) of all Representatives scored "above average."



- 06 About one-third, (169) of Congressional members combined scored "above average."
- **07** The Senate launched an Anti-Semitism Task Force during the 116th Congress.
- OS Sixty two members of Congress (11.6%) are recognized as Notable Leaders for advancing IRF legislation during the 116th Congress.
- Senator Marco Rubio R-FL and Congressman Brad Sherman D-CA earned top scores in the 116th Congress. See Notable Leaders listing for other members of Congress recognized for their engagement on IRF issues.
- Thirty-three members of Congress (6.2%) participated in the Defending Freedoms Project by selecting one or more Prisoners of Conscience and advocating on their behalf. There are currently 23 prisoners from 12 countries without advocates (waiting to be selected) in this program.
- Twelve items (12%) of all IRF legislative items are identified as "global" versus one particular region. The one "global" issue that was introduced in the 115th Congress and the 116th Congress is blasphemy.
- As was true with the 115th Congress Scorecard, Asia topped the list of regions for IRF legislative focus during the 116th Congress. Forty-seven items were scored relevant to Asia which represents 51.6% of all IRF items scored during the 116th Congress.
- **13** Europe represented 7.7% of all items scored; Africa represented 4.4%.
- The biggest shift in geographic focus from the 115th Congress to the 116th Congress is the reduction in IRF items related to Africa (from 9 to 4).
- Uyghur human rights led IRF legislative activity with eight items introduced (9% of total in Senate and House).
- Two items about the use of technology in China to monitor citizen activity were introduced in the Senate and the House.



- Hong Kong threats to freedom and human rights represented 5.5% (5) of all IRF legislative activity in the 116th Congress.
- Iran human rights violations, and persecution of Baha'i minority accounted for 6 (6.6%) items scored."
- 19 Burma human rights and Rohingya genocide determination accounted for 4 items scored.
- The 2019 Easter bombings in Sri Lanka spawned four legislative items with a fifth item focused on the 10th anniversary of civil war.

METHODOLOGY



OVERVIEW

The International Religious Freedom (IRF) Congressional Scorecard

reports on the 116th Congress, the term of which was January 2019 through December 2020. The scoring system is designed to encourage reliable and consistent scoring of federal legislation relevant to international religious freedom. To avoid bias, we base inclusion criteria on important bills, resolutions, and amendments that protect and promote international religious freedom in the U.S. Senate and the House. Legislative data is sourced from www.congress.gov.

Legislators can also demonstrate their support through membership in caucuses. For the House, scoring acknowledges membership in the International Religious Freedom Caucus, the Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission, the Congressional Ahmadiyya Muslim Caucus, the Religious Minorities in the Middle East (RMME) Caucus and the Defending Freedoms Project. Members in the Senate who participate in the Senate Human Rights Caucus, the Senate Bipartisan Task Force for Combatting Anti-Semitism and the Defending Freedoms Project also earn points.

It is important to note that while the IRF Congressional Scorecard is a resource for analyzing a legislator's current support for international religious freedom issues, it is not the only measure of his or her record. Many bills and resolutions introduced in Congress are never scheduled for a vote. For that reason, the IRF Congressional Scorecard awards points for sponsorship or cosponsorship of relevant international religious freedom bills that are introduced but have not received a vote.

FIVE METRICS

Metrics scored with points awarded for the following demonstrations of support:

- I. Sponsoring or cosponsoring IRF bills, resolutions, and amendments
- II. Voting for such items
- III. Chairing or co-chairing relevant caucuses
- IV. Membership in relevant caucuses
- V. Participation as a Congressional Advocate for Prisoner of Conscience/Defending Freedoms Project

Low scores do not necessarily indicate disagreement with international religious freedom legislation, but rather that it was not a high priority for that legislator. Conversely, high scores indicate that a given legislator has made support of international religious freedom a priority.

By custom, the Speaker of the House (Nancy Pelosi D-CA) and the House Minority Leader (Kevin McCarthy R-CA) do not vote on all issues and, therefore, they are not scored. Representatives Amata Coleman Radewagen (R-AS), Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC), Michael F. Q. San Nichholas (D-GU), Gregorio Sablan (D-NMI), Jenniffer González-Colón (R-PR) and Stacey Plaskett (D-VI) served as non-voting delegates, but their level of support for scored items is noted.

Selection criteria for **Notable Leaders** in the Senate is a score of 23 points or higher and in the House a score of 35 points or higher.

PARTICIPANTS IN THE SCORECARD PROCESS

An analyst is responsible for determining the content of the Scorecard, including evaluation criteria and scores. Our research associate manages the Scorecard process and participates in data-gathering and scoring. 21Wilberforce staff provide feedback on the legislation selected to be scored.

DISCLAIMER

A Scorecard is an imperfect tool; there are additional factors that cannot be reflected therein. Not all efforts made in the promotion and protection of international religious freedom can be publicly recorded. We recognize that members and their staff can and do support international religious freedom through quiet diplomacy and casework, such as letters to the President, legislators, ambassadors, and other foreign officials. Members also prioritize efforts on behalf of their constituents. Additionally, familyrelated issues may arise, such as the birth of a child or a death in the family, which may result in legislators missing votes.

The IRF Congressional Scorecard is an educational tool meant to highlight and track key activity related to international religious freedom. It should not be perceived as an effort to support or endorse specific legislators or candidates.

1. <u>S.178</u> Uyghur Human Rights Policy Act of 2019

This bill directs the President to impose sanctions and export restrictions related to China's treatment of the Uyghurs, a predominantly Muslim Turkic ethnic group.

2. <u>S.357</u> Saudi Educational Transparency and Reform Act

This bill directs the State Department to report annually on whether educational materials published by Saudi Arabia's Ministry of Education include content that encourages violence and intolerance toward religious groups, including Muslims who hold dissenting views. The report shall also include the extent such materials are exported and efforts by the Saudi government to remove any intolerant content.

3. <u>S.480</u> Countering the Chinese Government and Commust Party's Political Influence Operations Act

This bill requires an unclassified interagency report on the political influence of the Chinese government and the Communist Party of China with respect to the U.S.

4. <u>S.1186</u> Burma Human Rights and Freedom Act of 2019

This bill authorizes aid to address the humanitarian crisis in Burma (Myanmar) and calls for sanctions and reports related thereto.

Primary Sponsor: Benjamin Cardin D-MD Status: 4/11/19 Referred to the Foreign Relations Committee, 23 Cosponsors

5. <u>S.1369</u> Vietnam Human Rights Sanctions Act of 2019

This bill requires the President to (1) impose financial sanctions on, and prohibit U.S. entry by, nationals of Vietnam who are complicit in human rights abuses committed against nationals of Vietnam or their family members, regardless of whether such abuses occurred in Vietnam; and (2) submit to Congress a publicly available list of individuals determined to be complicit in such human rights abuses.

6. <u>S.1459</u> China Technology Transfer Control Act of 2019

This bill controls the export to the People's Republic of China of certain technology and intellectual property important to the national interest of the U.S.

7. <u>S.1838</u> Hong Kong Human Rights and Democracy Act of 2019

This law directs various departments to assess whether political developments in Hong Kong justify changing Hong Kong's unique treatment under U.S. law.

8. <u>S.2351</u> Saudi Arabia Human Rights and Accountability Act of 2019

This bill requires the State Department to report the extent to which Saudi Arabia is responsible for gross violations of internationally recognized human rights and about U.S. actions to address such violations. The report shall also describe the publication by Saudi Arabia's Ministry of Education of intolerant educational materials and U.S. actions to encourage an end to the production and use of such materials.

9. <u>S.2503</u> United States Commission on International Religious Freedom Reauthorization Act of 2019

This bill reauthorizes the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom.

10. <u>S.2359</u> Tibetan Policy and Support Act of 2019

This bill modifies and reauthorizes the Tibetan Policy Act of 2002.

Primary Sponsor: Marco Rubio R-FL Status: 9/24/19 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee, <u>25</u> Cosponsors *See H.R.4331 11. S.3018 A bill to require the United States Executive Director of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development to oppose assistance by the Bank for any country that exceeds the graduation threshold of the Bank and is of concern with respect to religious freedom.

This bill requires the U.S. Executive Director of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development to oppose any extension of financial or technical assistance by the bank to a country that both exceeds the graduation threshold of the bank and is designated as a country of particular concern for religious freedom.

12. <u>S.3064</u> Ukraine Religious Freedom Support Act

This bill directs the President, when determining whether Russia is a country of particular concern for religious freedom, to consider incidents occurring in the parts of Ukraine controlled by Russia or Russia-affiliated non-state groups. (The U.S. may take certain actions, such as withdrawing development assistance, against a country of particular concern for religious freedom.)

13. <u>S.3471</u> Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act

This bill imposes various restrictions related to China's Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous region, including by prohibiting certain imports from Xinjiang and imposing sanctions on those responsible for human rights violations there.

14. <u>S.3744</u> Uyghur Human Rights Policy Act of 2020

This law imposes sanctions on foreign individuals and entities responsible for human rights abuses in China's Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous region and requires various reports on the topic.

Primary Sponsor: Marco Rubio R-FL Status: 5/14/20 Passed/agreed to in Senate; 5/27/20 Passed/agreed to in House; 6/17/20 Became Law, 66 Cosponsor

15. <u>S.3818</u> World Press Freedom Protection and Reciprocity Act

This bill protects and promotes the freedom of the press globally.

Primary Sponsor: Marco Rubio R-FL Status: 5/21/20 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee, <u>1</u> Cosponsor *See H.R.7001

16. <u>S.3819</u> Protecting Human Rights During Pandemic Act

This bill encourages the protection and promotion of internationally recognized human rights during the novel coronavirus pandemic.

Primary Sponsor: Edward A. Markey D-MA Status: 5/21/20 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee, 9 Cosponsors *See H.R.6986

17. <u>S.4659</u> Rohingya Genocide Determination Act of 2020

This bill requires a determination as to whether crimes committed against the Rohingya in Burma amount to genocide.

Primary Sponsor: Edward A. Markey D-MA Status: 9/23/20 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee, 7 Cosponsors *See H.R.8744

22. S.Res. 176 A resolution condemning the terrorist attacks on Christian worshipers in Sri Lanka on Easter Sunday, April 21, 2019, and standing with the Government of Sri Lanka to encourage the protection and preservation of religious liberties.

This resolution condemns the terrorist attacks in Sri Lanka and declares that the Senate stands with the government of Sri Lanka in bringing peace and security to the citizens of Sri Lanka, particularly the religious communities of that nation.

Primary Sponsor: Josh Hawley R-MO Status: 4/30/19 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee, <u>8</u> Cosponsors *See S.Res.184, H.Res.336 23. S.Res. 184 A resolution condemning the Easter Sunday terrorist attacks in Sri Lanka, offering sincere condolences to the victims, to their families and friends, and to the people and nation of Sri Lanka, and expressing solidarity and support for Sri Lanka.

This resolution condemns the terrorist attacks in Sri Lanka by Islamic extremists against innocent civilians, offers condolences to those affected, and notes the importance of national unity in light of the 10th anniversary of the end of Sri Lanka's civil war.

Primary Sponsor: James Risch R-ID Status: 6/10/19 Agreed to in Senate, <u>15</u> Cosponsors *See S.Res.176, H.Res.336

24. <u>S.Res.198</u> A resolution condemning Brunei's dramatic human rights backsliding.

This resolution censures Brunei's criminal laws with respect to sexual orientation and adultery and supports the withdrawal and denial of U.S. visas for Brunei officials responsible for the implementation of such laws until they are repealed.

Primary Sponsor: Richard Durbin D-IL Status: 7/16/19 Agreed to in Senate, 14 Cosponsors

25. <u>S.Res.215</u> A resolution calling for greater religious and political freedoms in Cuba, and for other purposes.

This resolution expresses solidarity with Cuban citizens, and calls on Cuba and the U.S. to implement specified measures to promote human rights and democracy in Cuba.

26. S.Res.221 A resolution recognizing the 30th anniversary of the Tiananmen Square massacre and condemning the intensifying repression and human rights violations by the Chinese Communist Party and the use of surveillance by Chinese authorities, and for other purposes.

This resolution expresses sympathy for the family and friends of the victims of the Tiananmen Square massacre and condemns the use of violence against those who speak out against the Chinese Communist Party. It calls on the Chinese government to cease its current repression of the Chinese people and calls on the international community to address the Chinese government's continued persecution and mass surveillance of its citizens.

Primary Sponsor: Cory Gardner R-CO Status: 6/5/19 Agreed to in Senate, 8 Cosponsors 27. S.Res.274 A resolution expressing solidarity with Falun Gong practitioners who have lost lives, freedoms, and other rights for adhering to their beliefs and practices, and condemning the practice of non-consenting organ harvesting, and for other purposes.

This resolution condemns non-consensual organ harvesting of prisoners in China and calls on China to immediately cease the persecution and imprisonment of Falun Gong practitioners.

Senate Human Rights Caucus

Defending Freedoms Project

The **Defending Freedoms Project** (DFP) supports prisoners of conscience around the world. DFP aims to increase attention to human rights abuses by encouraging Members of Congress to advocate on behalf of prisoners of conscience wherever they may be found. The project allows Members to stand in solidarity with prisoners of conscience, let them know they have not been forgotten, and encourage accountability for unjust treatment. Any Member of Congress who chooses to support the case of a prisoner is provided with a detailed toolkit to help facilitate in his/her advocacy efforts.

By taking on a prisoner's case, the Member could contribute to the release or reduction of a prison sentence or the improvement of prison conditions, while also raising awareness about the unjust laws or policies that led to imprisonment. The project is flexible, allowing Members to determine and pursue different advocacy activities.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND RELIGIOUS FREEDOM GROUPS FOR MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Bipartisan Task Force for Combating Anti-Semitism

The Task Force works to ensure that Congress plays an integral role in condemning anti-Semitism and spearheading initiatives that promote tolerance worldwide. In the 116th Congress, the Task Force will continue to serve as a forum for educating Members on this distinct form of intolerance and to engage with the Administration, foreign leaders, and civil society organizations to share best practices and collaborate on solutions to rebuff this systemic problem. It will also promote Holocaust remembrance

in concert with exploring innovative ways to teach tolerance and confront hate. Representatives Nita Lowey (D-NY), Chris Smith (R-NJ), Eliot Engel (D-NY), Kay Granger (R-TX), Ted Deutch (D-FL), Randy Weber (R-TX), Marc Veasey (D-TX), and Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA) re-launched the Bipartisan Task Force for Combating Anti-Semitism in the House of Representatives for the 116th Congress. The task force had 151 total members in the 116th Congress.

Congressional Ahmadiyya Muslim Caucus

The Ahmadiyya Muslim Caucus was launched in 2014 by former Congressman Frank Wolf (R-VA) and Jackie Speier (D-CA) to educate members of Congress about the repression of religious minorities worldwide, including Ahmadi Muslims, Christians and other persecuted communities. Current co-chairs are Speier and Peter King (R-NY). The caucus seeks redress for ongoing religious intolerance against Ahmadi Muslims in South and Central Asia. the Middle East and East Asia, including Pakistan, Saudi Arabia and Indonesia. This bipartisan caucus staunchly opposes persecution and violence against all religious minorities and believes that everyone should have the right to worship as they choose.

Congressional International Religious Freedom Caucus

Founded in 2006, the bipartisan Congressional International Religious Freedom Caucus was established to address religious persecution around the world. It plays a critical role in raising the profile of numerous religious freedom issues in Congress. Its work has led to the release of many individuals imprisoned for their faith and ensures relief for many suffering under religious persecution.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND RELIGIOUS FREEDOM GROUPS FOR MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Religious Minorities in the Middle East Caucus

The Religious Minorities in the Middle East Caucus, founded in 2008, is a bipartisan Congressional Member organization that serves as an informational and advocacy tool for besieged religious minorities who are central to a pluralistic, multi-cultural Middle East.

Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission

Founded in 2008, the bipartisan Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission is charged with promoting, defending and advocating for international human rights as enshrined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The Commission undertakes public education activities, provides expert human rights advice and encourages members of Congress to proactively engage in human rights matters, of which international religious freedom is one. In carrying out its mandate, the Commission collaborates with congressional staff, the U.S. Senate and the executive branch, and continually engages with national and international civil society organizations.

Defending Freedoms Project

The **Defending Freedoms Project** (DFP) supports prisoners of conscience around the world. DFP aims to increase attention to human rights abuses by encouraging Members of Congress to advocate on behalf of prisoners of conscience wherever they may be found. The project allows Members to stand in solidarity with prisoners of conscience, let them know they have not been forgotten, and encourage accountability for unjust treatment. Any Member of Congress who chooses to support the case of a prisoner is provided with a detailed toolkit to help facilitate in his/her advocacy efforts.

By taking on a prisoner's case, the Member could contribute to the release or reduction of a prison sentence or the improvement of prison conditions, while also raising awareness about the unjust laws or policies that led to imprisonment. The project is flexible, allowing Members to determine and pursue different advocacy activities.
