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INTRODUCTION

Embattled religious minorities suffer extraordinary pressures — even genocide and the threat of extinction — as the essential freedom of religion deteriorates worldwide. Defending the fundamental right to conscience is a leading challenge of our time.

Here in the U.S., that effort begins in partnership with congressional leadership. To that end, we present the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard for the 117th session of Congress. This simple and informative tool measures important steps taken by members of Congress who have demonstrated the moral clarity needed to counter affronts to international religious freedom.

In addition to caucus and commission work, the Scorecard tracks how members of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives sponsored, cosponsored, and voted on bills, resolutions, and amendments that support international religious freedom. Unlike scorecards published by most other organizations, this one is nonpartisan. We do not promote specific legislation, nor do we offer opinions about the work that was done in the 117th Congress.

The goals of publishing the Congressional International Religious Freedom Scorecard are to:

- a. Recognize and thank members of Congress who have championed international religious freedom in tangible ways;
- b. Encourage legislators to take even bolder actions in support of this cause and the restoration of human dignity around the world; and
- c. Provide citizens with a nonpartisan, concise summary of public actions taken by Congress on issues related to international religious freedom.

The [International Religious Freedom Act of 1998 \(IRFA\)](#) and the amplified [Frank R. Wolf International Religious Freedom Act of 2016](#), provide the framework for advancing religious freedom as a U.S. foreign policy imperative. In this same spirit, the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard is published as a measure of progress toward that end. The Scorecard celebrates positive measures taken by members of Congress and also highlights opportunities that remain to further advance U.S. advocacy on behalf of individuals persecuted in foreign countries on account of religious beliefs.

The United States Commission on International Religious Freedom ([USCIRF](#)) is an independent, bipartisan U.S. federal government agency created by the 1998 International Religious Freedom Act (IRFA), as amended. USCIRF monitors the universal right to freedom of religion or belief (FoRB) abroad; makes policy recommendations to the President, Secretary of State, and Congress; and tracks the implementation of these recommendations.

- 01** Congress introduced 58 items (27 in the Senate and 31 in the House) relating to freedom of belief, freedom of conscience, or religion during the 117th Congress.
- 02** This activity represents a 36% decrease in the number of items introduced and scored in the 117th Congress versus the 116th Congress.
- 03** Three IRF items were voted into law during the 117th Congress: S.3985 USCIRF Reauthorization Act of 2022, H.R.6256 Uyghur Forced Labor Act, and H.R.7776 Authorization Act which included Burma Act Amendment.

- 04** As was true with the 116th Congress, overall final scoring for the 117th Congress shows bipartisan support for IRF issues, with Democrats and Republicans working together as primary sponsors, and cosponsors, and voting on IRF legislation in the Senate and the House.
- 05** Forty-five percent (45) of all Senators scored "above average".
- 06** Thirty-nine percent (170) of all Representatives scored "above average".
- 07** Forty percent (215) of Congressional members scored "above average".
- 08** One hundred twenty-four members of Congress (23%) are recognized as Notable Leaders for advancing IRF legislation during the 117th Congress.
- 09** Senate Notable Leaders: 51% Democrats and 48% Republicans; House Notable Leaders: 68% Democrats and 31% Republicans.
- 10** Senator Marco Rubio R-FL and Congressman James McGovern D-MA earned top scores in the 117th Congress. See the Notable Leaders listing for other members of Congress recognized for their engagement on IRF issues.
- 11** Thirty-one members of Congress (6%) participated in the Defending Freedoms Project by selecting one or more Prisoners of Conscience and advocating on their behalf.
- 12** Seven (12%) IRF legislative items are identified as "Global" versus one particular region or country.
- 13** As was true with the 116th Congress Scorecard, Asia topped the list of regions for IRF legislative focus during the 117th Congress. Forty-three bills, resolutions, and laws were scored with Central Asia being the predominant focus with thirty-eight items introduced.
- 14** The Middle East represented four items (6% of all items scored) followed by South Asia and North America each with three items scored.

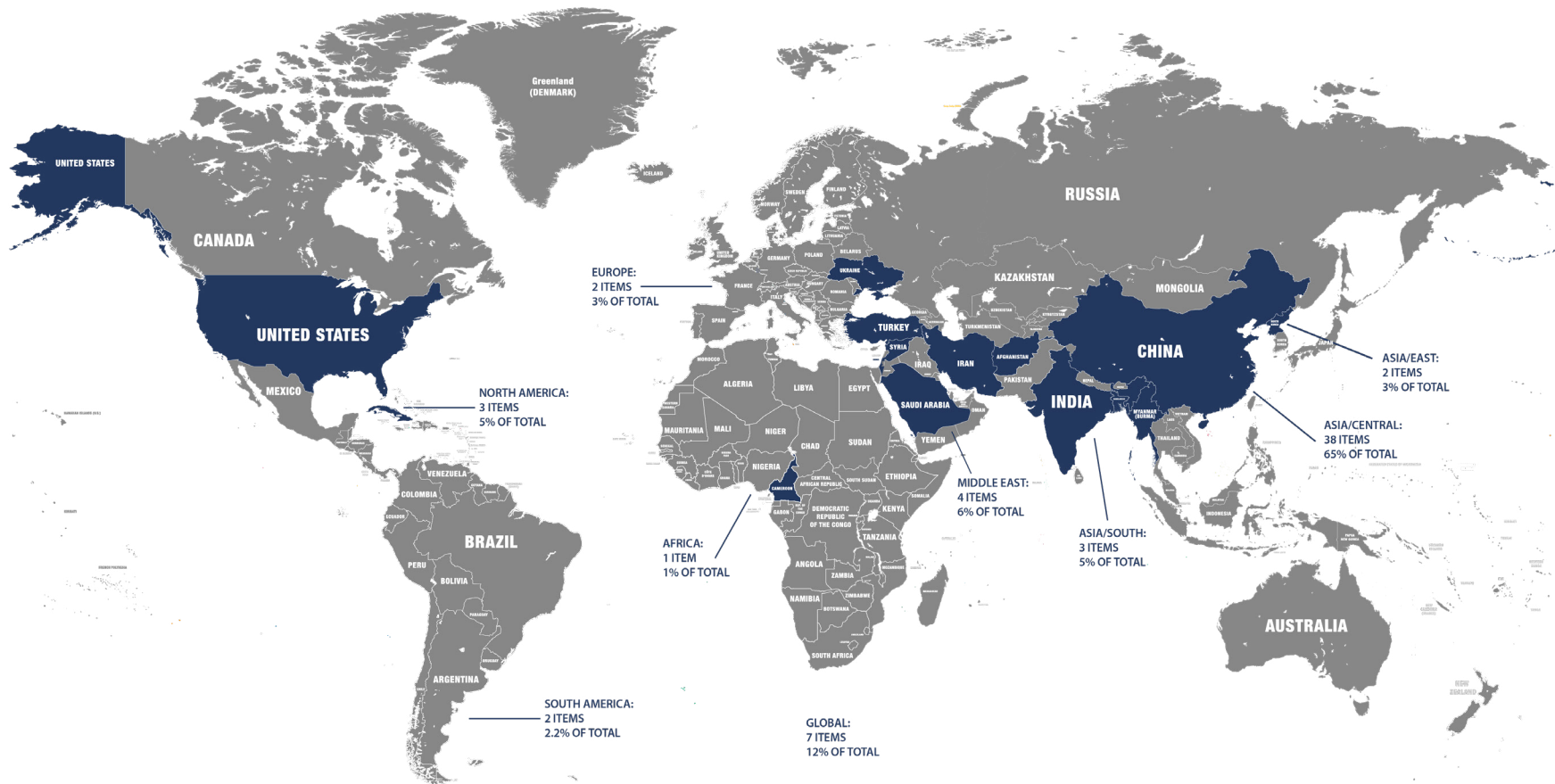

- 15** The biggest increase in geographic focus from the Scorecard for the 116th Congress to the current one for the 117th Congress is Central Asia.
- 16** Once again, Uyghur human rights led IRF legislative activity with 12 items introduced (21% of items scored in Senate and House.)
- 17** Iran's human rights violations, including the persecution of the Baha'i minority in Iran, accounted for 8 (14%) of the items scored.
- 18** Burma human rights and Rohingya genocide determination accounted for 6 items (10% of items scored in Senate and House.)
- 19** Issues scored under the Global category include two items each for anti-Semitism, and fighting Islamophobia.
- 20** Women and girls account for six items (10%) and the Olympics account for three items (5%) of all items scored.

OVERVIEW

The **International Religious Freedom (IRF) Congressional Scorecard** reports on the 117th Congress, the term of which was January 2021 through December 2022. The scoring system is designed to encourage reliable and consistent scoring of federal legislation relevant to international religious freedom. To avoid bias, we base inclusion criteria on important bills, resolutions, and amendments that protect and promote international religious freedom in the U.S. Senate and the House. Legislative data is sourced from www.congress.gov.

Legislators can also demonstrate their support through membership in caucuses and by participating in the Defending Freedoms Project.. For the House, scoring acknowledges membership in the International Religious Freedom Caucus, the Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission, the Congressional Ahmadiyya Muslim Caucus, the Religious Minorities in the Middle East (RMME) Caucus, and the Defending Freedoms Project. Members of the Senate who participate in the Senate Human Rights Caucus, the Senate Bipartisan Task Force for Combatting Anti-Semitism, and the Defending Freedoms Project also earn points.

It is important to note that while the IRF Congressional Scorecard is a resource for analyzing a legislator's support for international religious freedom issues during the 117th Congress, it is not the only measure of his or her record. Many bills and resolutions introduced in Congress are never scheduled for a vote. For that reason, the IRF Congressional Scorecard awards points for sponsorship or co-sponsorship of relevant international religious freedom bills that are introduced, but have not received a vote.

FIVE METRICS

Metrics scored with points awarded for the following demonstrations of support:

- I. Sponsoring or cosponsoring IRF bills, resolutions, and amendments
- II. Voting for such items
- III. Chairing or co-chairing relevant caucuses
- IV. Membership in relevant caucuses
- V. Participate as a Congressional Advocate for Prisoner of Conscience/Defending Freedoms Project

Low scores do not necessarily indicate disagreement with international religious freedom legislation, but rather that it was not a high priority for that legislator. Conversely, high scores indicate that a given legislator has made support of international religious freedom a priority.

Representatives Amata Coleman Radewagen (R-AS), Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC), Michael F. Q. San Nicolas (D-GU), Gregorio Sablan (D-NMI), Jenniffer González-Colón (R-PR) and Stacey Plaskett (D-VI) served as non-voting delegates, but their level of support for scored items is noted.

The selection criteria for **Notable Leaders** in the Senate and the House is an A+ or A grade.

PARTICIPANTS IN THE SCORECARD PROCESS

An analyst is responsible for determining the content of the Scorecard, including evaluation criteria and scores. Our research associate manages the Scorecard process and participates in data-gathering and scoring. Sabatier Consulting staff provide feedback on the legislation selected to be scored.

DISCLAIMER

A Scorecard is an imperfect tool; there are additional factors that cannot be reflected therein. Not all efforts made in the promotion and protection of international religious freedom can be publicly recorded. We recognize that members and their staff can and do support international religious freedom through quiet diplomacy and casework, such as letters to the President, legislators, ambassadors, and other foreign officials. Members also prioritize efforts on behalf of their constituents. And last, family-related issues may arise, such as the birth of a child or a death in the family, which may result in legislators missing votes.

The IRF Congressional Scorecard is an educational tool meant to highlight and track key activities related to international religious freedom. It should not be perceived as an effort to support or endorse specific legislators or candidates.
