Dear Friends,

The 21st Century Wilberforce Initiative (21CWI) is pleased to announce the release of the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard for the 114th session of Congress. The Scorecard was originally created by international religious freedom advocate, Lindsay Vessey (Griffin), who transferred rights to the 21st Century Wilberforce Initiative. The International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard illuminates the voting records of members of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives for bills, resolutions, and amendments that support international religious freedom. For the 114th Congressional session, we selected votes on the basis of their significance to international religious freedom. The Scorecard tracks international religious freedom-related caucus work, sponsorship of bills, and votes in the House and the Senate.

International religious freedom issues are growing in urgency and importance worldwide. The purposes of the Scorecard are to help increase congressional awareness of international religious freedom issues, to encourage legislators to take bold action in support of this cause, and to laud the work of congressional religious freedom champions to the public.



I would like to thank those legislators and their staff who recognize the importance of supporting International Religious Freedom by working to defend persecuted people worldwide. There are currently 61 members of the International Religious Freedom Caucus, 57 members of the House Religious Minorities in the Middle East Caucus, and 85 members of the Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission. The Senate does not have any formal entity to organize its efforts to promote international religious freedom.

A key achievement in the 114th session was the passage, with overwhelming bipartisan support, of the Frank R. Wolf International Religious Freedom Act, which expands U.S. ability to advance religious freedom worldwide through enhanced diplomacy, training, counter terrorism efforts, and stronger political responses to religious freedom violations and violent extremism. President Obama signed this into law December 16, 2016.

Also significant was the declaration that atrocities perpetrated by ISIS against religious and ethnic minorities in Iraq and Syria should be designated and prosecuted as war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide.

The need to protect and promote religious freedom is more critical now than ever. I am hopeful the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard will spur the 115th Congress to more proactively address the continuing and escalating religious freedom crisis worldwide.



Today, more than 70% of the world, an astounding 5.3 billion people, live in countries characterized by religious persecution, discrimination or restrictions. According to a 2015 Pew Research report, harassment of specific religious groups takes many forms, including:

- physical assaults and killings
- arrests and detentions
- desecration of holy sites
- discrimination against religious groups in employment, education, and housing

Collectively, more people are persecuted for their faith now than at any other time in the world's history. This includes more than 100 million people killed under repressive secularist and communist regimes in the 20th century.

According to a recent U.S. State Department International Religious Freedom (IRF) report, which assesses religious freedom in nearly 200 countries, terrorists are now the greatest threat to people of faith. The IRF report confirms that the threat to persecuted Christians, the

most persecuted faith community worldwide, and other religious minorities is the "new phenomenon" of non-state terrorism, particularly in the Middle East, Sub-Saharan Africa, and Asia.

This echoes the findings of the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom (USCIRF), which also identified non-state actors as a "major challenge to freedom of religion or belief" in its 2016 report.

It is against this backdrop of people of faith facing marginalization, imprisonment, violence, persecution and at times even death, that we present the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard. International religious freedom is the human rights issue of our day.



IMPORTANCE OF THE INTERNATIONAL RELIGIOUS FREEDOM CONGRESSIONAL SCORECARD

Many issues compete for the time and attention of U.S. legislators. The majority of Congressmen and Senators say they believe in the importance of international religious freedom (IRF), but too often international religious freedom bills and resolutions do not receive sufficient attention.

The purpose of the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard is to keep members apprised of the opportunities to support this fundamental freedom. It also brings a measure of accountability and much needed credit to those who are making international religious freedom a priority.

Federal legislators can help our nation lead in the protection and promotion of religious freedom by publicizing various issues and cases, by passing bills in support of religious freedom, and, in some instances, by exerting pressure in support of religious freedom. It is critical that legislators use their influence to support those who are persecuted for their faith.

The International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard measures legislators' prioritization of international religious freedom and scores members of Congress based on their votes. Scoring covers important bills, resolutions, and amendments that protect and promote international religious freedom in both the Senate and the House, throughout the 114th legislative session, beginning in January 2015 and concluding in December 2016. The votes recorded here are only a representation of all the votes cast by representatives and senators during the 114th Congress.

It is important to note that while the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard is a critical tool for analyzing a legislator's current international religious freedom voting record, it is not the only measure of that record. Traditionally, most scorecards look only at issues that were

brought to a vote – they do not capture statements or other forms of discussion and debate, on and off Capitol Hill, that also contribute to the totality of a legislator's views.

Many bills and resolutions introduced in Congress are never scheduled for a vote. For that reason, the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard includes sponsorship or co-sponsorship of important international religious freedom items that do not make it to a vote. Typically, international religious freedom items that reach a vote receive a majority of legislators' support. Thus, scoring only voted items would not be particularly instructive. In this way, the International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard is different from traditional scorecards.

Legislators in the House can also demonstrate support for international religious freedom through membership in the International Religious Freedom Caucus, the Religious Minorities in the Middle East (RMME) Caucus, and the Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission.

Low scores do not necessarily indicate disagreement with international religious freedom, but reflect that it was not a high priority for that legislator. Conversely, high scores demonstrate that a given legislator actively supported international religious freedom legislation and has made support of international religious freedom a priority.

The International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard is an educational tool and should not be perceived as an effort to support or endorse specific legislators or candidates.

- The results from scoring this session are bipartisan. This holds true for the Senate and the House of Representatives for the 114th session of Congress.
- Congress can do more to prioritize IRF. Overall, 172 legislators (33%) received scores of A+, A or B. One-third of federal elected representatives in the United States are making international religious freedom an “above average” priority based on the results of this Scorecard.
- The Senate has been less engaged in promoting religious freedom than the House. While there are individual leaders, the Senate does not have caucuses. This lack of formal organization results in a lack of IRF leadership as a whole for the Senate.
- When measures do come up for a vote in the Senate or the House, they almost always pass with an overwhelming majority or unanimously. The challenge is moving a piece of legislation to the vote stage.
- There is ample opportunity for members of the Senate and the House to engage on IRF in the 115th session of Congress. Seven of the 14 resolutions introduced in the Senate have not come to a vote, and nineteen of the 25 resolutions introduced in the House have not come to a vote.

METHODOLOGY

CALCULATION OF SCORES AND GRADES

Letter grades are assigned based on the number of items each legislator supported. This includes voting on scored items and sponsoring or co-sponsoring international religious freedom bills, resolutions, and amendments. Primary sponsors and co-sponsors of any scored items and chairs/co-chairs of relevant caucuses received extra credit. By custom, the Speaker of the House (Paul Ryan) and the House Minority leader (Nancy Pelosi) do not vote on all issues and, therefore, they have not been scored.

Since Madeleine Bordallo (D-GU), Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC), Stacey Plaskett (D-VI), Amata Radewagen (R-AS), Gregorio Sablan (D-NMI) and Pedro Pierluisi (D-PR) are non-voting delegates, they are ineligible for a rating.

SCORING FOR THE SENATE AWARDED POINTS AS FOLLOWS:

Theoretical maximum points per measure are 3 points if Senator voted for it (1 point) and was an original sponsor or primary sponsor for it (2 points for either). So $14 \times 3 = 42$ points. But 7 of the measures have not been voted on, so getting those 7 points is not possible yet. No caucuses or committees in the Senate.

Therefore, the maximum points possible in the Senate are $42 - 7 = 35$.

Co-sponsor for a bill or amendment or voting for it: 1 point

Original co-sponsor or primary sponsor for a bill or amendment: 2 points

Maximum possible points per bill or amendment: 3

When a measure passed by unanimous consent or voice vote, each scored member received credit for an affirmative vote.

Maximum possible point score for the Senate: 35

(7 of 14 scored items have not yet come to a vote)

SCORING FOR THE HOUSE AWARDED POINTS AS FOLLOWS:

Theoretical maximum points per measure are 3 points if Representative voted for it (1 point) and was an original sponsor or primary sponsor for it (2 points for either). So $25 \times 3 = 75$ points. In addition, there are two caucuses and a commission, each of which can give Representatives either 1 (member) or 2 points (co-chair). So that is $3 \times 2 = 6$. Subtotal is 81 points. But 19 measures have not been voted on, so getting those 19 points is not possible yet. **Therefore, the maximum total points in the House are $81 - 19 = 62$.**

Co-sponsor for a bill or amendment or voting for it: 1 point

Original co-sponsor or primary sponsor for a bill or amendment: 2 points

Scoring for the House also includes membership or chairmanship of the two IRF-related House Caucus groups and the Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission. Representatives received 1 point for membership in each of these groups and an additional point if they served as co-chair.

Maximum possible points per bill or amendment: 3

Maximum possible points for membership/chairmanship of caucus or commission: 6

When a measure passed by unanimous consent or voice vote, each scored member received credit for an affirmative vote.

Maximum possible point score for the House: 62
(19 of 25 scored items have not yet come to a vote)

Once scores were tabulated, the mean and average scores across each group were calculated, and a letter-grade (A+, A, B, C, D or F) was attached to each legislator's score using a weighted bell curve. The result placed the median score in the C-grade range.

A grade of C represents an average level of international religious freedom support. We scored 14 items in the Senate, for a maximum possible 35 points. In the House, we scored 25 items and gave extra credit for membership in the IRF and RMME Caucuses and/or the Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission, for a maximum possible 62 points.

A scorecard is an imperfect tool; there are additional factors that cannot be reflected in a scorecard. Not all efforts made in the promotion and protection of international religious freedom can be publicly recorded. Many members and their staff support international religious freedom through quiet diplomacy and casework, such as letters to the President and other legislators, which have not been included in this Scorecard. Legislators also prioritize efforts on behalf of their constituents. Finally, family-related issues may arise, such as the birth of a child or a death in the family, which may result in legislators missing votes.

1. S. Con. Res. 46 – A concurrent resolution expressing support for the goal of ensuring that all Holocaust victims live with dignity, comfort, and security in their remaining years, and urging the Federal Republic of Germany to continue to reaffirm its commitment to comprehensively address the unique health and welfare needs of vulnerable Holocaust victims, including home care and other medically prescribed needs.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Bill Nelson D-FL

Status: 7/14/16 Passed Senate, by Unanimous Consent; 9/12/16 Passed House by Voice Vote; 11 Co-sponsors

2. S. Res. 69 – Protection of religious minority rights and freedoms worldwide (identical to H. Res. 105). This resolution urges the U.S. government to lead the international effort in calling for the repeal of all existing apostasy and blasphemy laws.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. James Inhofe R-OK

Status: 2/5/15 Referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations; 10 Co-sponsors

3. S. Res. 148 – Condemnation of the Government of Iran's state-sponsored persecution of its Baha'i minority and its continued violation of the International Covenants on Human Rights.

This resolution urges the President and the Secretary of State, in cooperation with responsible nations, to condemn the government of Iran's continued violation of human rights and demand the release of prisoners held solely on account of their religion.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Mark Kirk R-IL

Status: 12/17/15 Passed Senate Amended, by Unanimous Consent; 38 Co-sponsors

4. S. Res. 180 – Additional sanctions against the Democratic People's Republic of Korea.

Warns the President against resuming negotiations with North Korea, either bilaterally or as part of the Six Party talks, without strict pre-conditions, one of which is that North Korea improves its human rights record, which includes a long history of religious persecution.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Cory Gardner R-CO

Status: 5/19/15 Referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations; 1 Cosponsor

5. S. Res. 310 – Condemnation of the ongoing sexual violence against women and children from Yazidi, Christian, Shabat, Turkmen and other religious communities by Islamic State of Iraq and Syria militants. This resolution calls on the government of Iraq and the governments of other countries to arrest and prosecute individuals who are perpetrators of or complicit in these crimes.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Ron Johnson R-WI
Status: 12/16/15 Passed Senate Amended, by Unanimous Consent; 6 Co-sponsors

6. S. Res. 340 – Expression of the sense of Congress that the so-called Islamic State in Iraq and al-Sham (ISIS or Da'esh) is committing genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes. This resolution calls upon the President to work with foreign governments and the United Nations to provide physical protection and humanitarian assistance for ISIS' targets, to support the creation of an international criminal tribunal with jurisdiction to punish these crimes, and to use every reasonable means, including sanctions, to destroy ISIS and disrupt its support networks. It also commends the governments of the Kurdistan Region of Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Turkey, and every other country sheltering individuals fleeing the violence of ISIS.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Bill Cassidy R-LA
Status: 7/7/16 Passed Senate, by Unanimous Consent; 17 Co-sponsors

7. S. 1632 – Regional strategy to address the threat posed by Boko Haram. This bill requires the Departments of State and Defense to jointly develop a five-year strategy to help Nigeria, members of the Multinational Joint Task Force to Combat Boko Haram, and relevant partners to counter Boko Haram and to assist Nigeria and its neighbors in addressing legitimate grievances of vulnerable populations in areas affected by Boko Haram.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Susan Collins R-ME
Status: 12/14/16 Became law (9/22/15 Passed Senate Amended, by Unanimous Consent; 12/7/16 Passed House, by Unanimous Consent); 18 Co-sponsors

8. S. 2078 – United States Commission on International Religious Freedom (USCIRF) Reauthorization Act of 2015

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Bob Corker R-TN
Status: 10/16/15 Became law (9/20/15 Passed Senate without amendment, by Unanimous Consent; 10/6/15 Passed House by Voice Vote)

9. S. 2447 – Vietnam Human Rights Sanctions Act. This bill requires the President to impose financial and immigration/entry sanctions on listed nationals of Vietnam who are complicit in human rights abuses committed against nationals of Vietnam or their family members, regardless of whether such abuses occurred in Vietnam. It also expresses that the Secretary of State should designate Vietnam as a country of particular concern with respect to religious freedom.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. John Cornyn R-TX
Status: 1/19/16 Referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations; 3 Co-sponsors

10. S. 2708 – Religious Persecution Relief Act.

This bill declares that Syrian nationals who are religious minorities in their country of origin shall be classified as refugees of special humanitarian concern, eligible for priority two processing under the refugee resettlement priority system, and may apply directly to the U.S. refugee admissions program for admission to the United States. The Immigration and Nationality Act is amended to authorize, in addition to the current worldwide refugee resettlement quota, the refugee admission of up to 10,000 religious-minority Syrian nationals for each of FY2016-FY2020.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Tom Cotton R-AR
Status: 3/17/16 Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary; 2 Co-sponsors

11. S. 2878 – Amendment of the International Religious Freedom Act of 1998. This bill improves the ability of the United States to advance religious freedom globally through enhanced diplomacy, training, counter-terrorism, and foreign assistance efforts, and through stronger and more flexible political responses to religious freedom violations and violent extremism worldwide.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Marco Rubio R-FL

Status: 4/28/16 Referred to Committee on Foreign Relations; 6 Co-sponsors

12. S. 3313 – Burma Strategy Act of 2016.

The United States supports Burma's political and economic reforms, including efforts to strengthen respect for and protection of human rights and religious freedom.

Primary Sponsor: Sen Benjamin Cardin D-MD

Status: 09/13/16 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations; 3 Co-sponsors

13. S. 3478 – Combating European Anti-Semitism Act of 2016. This bill expresses the sense of Congress that: (1) it is in the U.S. national interest to combat anti-Semitism at home and abroad; (2) there is a need to ensure the security of European Jewish communities, including synagogues, schools, and cemeteries; and (3) the United States should continue to emphasize the importance of combating anti-Semitism in multilateral bodies. The International Religious Freedom Act of 1998 is amended to require the Department of State's Annual Report on International Religious Freedom to include, for each European country in which threats or attacks against Jewish persons, schools, and religious institutions are particularly significant, a description of the security challenges and needs of European Jewish communities and European law enforcement agencies and of efforts to combat anti-Semitic incidents, raise public awareness of positive Jewish contributions, and develop a working definition of anti-Semitism.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Marco Rubio R-FL

Status: 11/17/16 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations; 10 Co-sponsors

14. S. Amdt. 1237 – Amendment to H.R. 1314: To establish consideration of the conditions relating to religious freedom of parties to trade negotiations as an overall negotiating objective of the United States.

Primary Sponsor: Sen. Lankford R-OK

Status: 5/18/15 Agreed to in Senate by Yea-Nay vote, 92-0; 3 Co-sponsors

14. H. This resolution calls on the President, the Department of State, and the U.S. Permanent Representative to the United Nations to provide humanitarian assistance, protect civilians, and help develop an effective resettlement strategy for displaced and persecuted persons in their communities of origin.

15. H. Res. 447 – Call for the President to use the United States' voice and vote in the United Nations Security Council to condemn the ongoing sexual violence against women and children from Yezidi, Christian, Shabak, and other religious communities by Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant militants as crimes against humanity, to prosecute all perpetrators and those complicit in these crimes, and to support other United Nations member states prosecuting these perpetrators and those complicit.

This bill directs the Secretary of State to establish or use existing refugee processing mechanisms in Iraq and in other countries through which aliens from Iraq or Syria who have been persecuted, or have a credible fear of being persecuted, by the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIS/ISIL), or a similar group, based on gender or religious or ethnic membership may apply directly to the United States Refugee Admissions Program for priority 2 refugee admission to the United States after background and security checks are conducted, including the use of biographic and biometric data.

20. H. R. 2140 – Vietnam Human Rights Act of 2015. This bill prohibits U.S. nonhumanitarian assistance to the government of Vietnam in excess of FY2014 amounts unless the President certifies to Congress that the government of Vietnam has made substantial progress respecting political, civil, media, Internet, and religious freedoms, minority rights, access to U.S. refugee programs, and actions to end trafficking in persons and the release of religious and political prisoners.

21. H. R. 3833 – Regional strategy to address the threat posed by Boko Haram. 24. H. R. 5974 – Coptic Churches Accountability Act. This bill directs the Department of State, until 2021, to submit an annual report describing the progress made in restoring or repairing Christian religious property and property owned by Christians in Egypt that was damaged or destroyed during the August 2013 sectarian violence, and the nature and extent of Egyptian laws and policies regarding the construction of Christian churches or places of worship.

Primary Sponsor: Rep. David Trott R-MI

Status: 9/8/16 Referred to the House Committee on Foreign Affairs; 4 Co-sponsors

25. H. R. 6208 – Combating European Anti-Semitism Act of 2016. This bill expresses the sense of Congress that: (1) it is in the U.S. national interest to combat anti-Semitism at home and abroad; (2) there is a need to ensure the security of European Jewish communities, including synagogues, schools, and cemeteries; and (3) the United States should continue to emphasize the importance of combating anti-Semitism in multilateral bodies. The International Religious Freedom Act of 1998 is amended to require the Department of State's

Annual Report on International Religious Freedom to include, for each European country in which threats or attacks against Jewish persons, schools, and religious institutions are particularly significant, a description of the security challenges and needs of European Jewish communities and European law enforcement agencies and of efforts to combat anti-Semitic incidents, raise public awareness of positive Jewish contributions, and develop a working definition of anti-Semitism.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND RELIGIOUS FREEDOM GROUPS FOR MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Congressional International Religious Freedom Caucus

Founded in 2006, the bipartisan, unicameral Congressional International Religious Freedom Caucus was established to address religious persecution around the world. The Caucus, which is only comprised of members of the House of Representatives, plays a critical role in raising the profile of numerous religious freedom issues in Congress. Its work has led to the release of many individuals imprisoned for their faith and ensures relief for many suffering under religious persecution.

Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission

Founded in 2008, the bipartisan, unicameral Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission is charged with promoting, defending and advocating for international human rights as enshrined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The Commission undertakes public education activities, provides expert human rights advice and encourages members of Congress to proactively engage in human rights matters, of which international religious freedom is one. In carrying out its mandate, the Commission collaborates with congressional staff, the U.S. Senate and the executive branch, and continually engages with national and international civil society organizations. Membership is free and open to all members of the House of Representatives.

Religious Minorities in the Middle East Caucus

The Religious Minorities in the Middle East Caucus is a bipartisan, unicameral Congressional Member organization that serves as an informational and advocacy tool for besieged religious minorities who are central to a pluralistic, multi-cultural Middle East. It is only comprised of members of the House of Representatives.
